Terms of Reference

Legal Consultation, Representation and Awareness Sessions for Refugees Greater Cairo ,Alexandria and Damietta



CARE International in Egypt:

CARE Egypt Foundation (CEF) is an Egyptian, non-governmental organization registered under number 833 for year 2018 at the Ministry Of Social Solidarity in Egypt. CARE harnessing the legacy of CARE International in Egypt since 1954 to fight poverty and improve livelihoods. Since 1954, CARE has become actively involved in development programming particularly in Upper Egypt.

We envision Egypt as a place where everyone enjoys economic opportunities, equality and social justice. We empower women and girls by sharing our values amongst the private sector, government and civil society.

Women's Rights Program

The Women's Rights (WR) Program is designed to empower poor and marginalized women in Egypt who suffer from rights' violation. Its impact goal is: By 2025, poor women in Egypt especially in Upper Egypt are empowered and enjoying a better quality of life, having attained their rights. In order to achieve this goal, the program works with both the duty bearers in government and civil society, as well as rights bearers, women themselves, to address discriminatory attitudes and behavior towards women and girls.

The WR program works with the duty bearers to support their role to protect and uphold the rights of women, and also with the women to encourage them to understand voice and demand their rightful entitlements. The program works on three domains (agency, relations and structure) in order to empower poor women in Egypt to gain their rights. Through the focus on agency, women's self-esteem and confidence are built, and women have increased financial independence to fulfill their potential as productive and income-earning members of their households and society. In addition, when power relations (families) are gender sensitive whilst tackling all forms of gender-based violence (GBV) within and outside the household, and when structures (social norms or laws) particularly in the area of personal status, domestic violence are reformed, passed and implemented, gender equality can be achieved.

The program has three themes, which are:

- 1. Tackling Gender-based Violence (GBV).
- 2. Women's Social and Economic Empowerment.
- 3. Engaging Men and Boys (EMB).

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Of the 260,287 refugee and asylum seekers registered with UNHCR Egypt as of February 2021, 50% are Syrian, with the other 50% including Sudanese, Ethiopian, South Sudanese, Eritrean, Yemeni and Somalian nationals. Most live in the urban areas of Greater Cairo and



on the North Coast alongside host communities.¹ Vulnerability levels of Syrian refugees in Egypt remain high, given challenges related to their legal status and limited livelihood opportunities. The most recent Vulnerability Assessment for Refugees (EVAR) in Egypt shows that 77% of refugees are unable to meet their basic needs – 81% among femaleheaded households – and 73% of households are forced to resort to negative coping mechanisms as a way of generating income, including children dropping out of school to contribute to household income and early marriage. The COVID-19 pandemic has continued to significantly impact the welfare of refugees and asylum seekers in Egypt, reducing their access to services and to income generation opportunities, particularly within the informal sector which many rely on for their livelihoods. Despite the need, as of March 2021, UNHCR Egypt reported that they had met just 13% of the funding required to meet these needs

Sexual and gender based violence (SGBV) is often exacerbated during humanitarian crises when the stability of the society is disrupted and the population is most vulnerable. Refugees are at an even greater risk as they lack the protection of their government and may have limited rights in their host countries. Sexual harassment is a pervasive problem in Egypt, which is currently affecting the more disadvantaged Syrian, African population. During the past years, Refugees women have reported instances of sexual harassment and physical violence in public spaces. In addition to other SGBV concerns such as domestic violence, early marriage, and exploitation of single and female headed households.

According to UNHCR, Egypt has seen a 24% increase in the number of refugees and asylum seekers in the last two years alone. As of February 2019, this population 53% of whom are Syrian reached 247,724, comprising 78% asylum seekers and 22% refugee

Since 2013, CARE International in Egypt has been implementing a holistic approach to address the problem of sexual and gender based violence among refugees. Through a combination of rights-based, survivor-centred, and community development approaches, CARE continues to raise awareness on the issue, enhance protection for individuals at risk, and support survivors who have faced various types of violence, exploitation, and abuse.

CARE Egypt conducted a baseline study in 2019 as part of its 2019 BPRM project aiming to assess the protection needs of the refugee population and existing violations. The study covered the communities selected within the targeted regions; namely, two communities in Greater Cairo (6th of October and Nasr City) and two communities in Alexandria (El Agamy and El Montaza). According to this study, 31.9% of the sampled females are exposed to sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV) versus 26.9% males. 74.2% of female respondents (Egyptians, Syrians and Sudanese) confirmed that violence is mostly committed in the public sphere in the form of sexual harassment and the perpetrators are mostly Egyptian men. However, 50% of male respondents confirmed that physical violence is the most common type of violence they experience.

Nevertheless, domestic violence (DV) and intimate partner violence (IPV) are common, as per findings from CARE's previous and ongoing programs and case management units. Indeed, CARE



found a dramatic increase in requests for SGBV support in 2019, where it received 1,553 referrals via walk-ins, calls on the helpline, and other partners in Cairo and Alexandria. Furthermore, early and forced marriages are becoming more common negative coping mechanisms among refugees, who often find themselves unable to afford and service debts to land lords and shop owners.

The project primarily targets Syrian and Sub-Saharan women and children living in Greater Cairo, Damietta and Alexandria, who are most susceptible to and affected by SGBV. It is estimated that approximately 70% of beneficiaries will be refugees from Syrian, Iraq and African countries and 30% host communities. The project additionally aims to engage men and boys in its various activities. In order to transform gender inequalities that social, cultural, economic and political systems perpetuate. Following CARE's Gender Frame work which encompasses agency, relations and structure and in order to create real sustained change, both men and women must be engaged in a synchronized way to ensure that work complements and reinforces the positive changes aimed for.

With an overall objective of **Refugees and vulnerable host community members, especially women and children, have improved protection in Greater Cairo, Damietta and Alexandria,** the four expected outcomes for this project are:

- 1) Women and girls gained knowledge and awareness on their rights and available services for SGBV
- 2) Values, beliefs, attitudes, behaviours and practices (individuals and communities) shift to recognize VAWC as unacceptable.
- 3) Schools, community schools and civil society organizations (Duty Bearers) promote and recognize gender equality, child protection and respect for all.
- 4) SGBV survivors access immediate response and protective services

Objective of the Assignment:

The objective of this assignment is two-fold:

- 1- Within the framework of the project's first outcome (1-1), legal sessions will be provided to attendees (Alexandria, Damietta and Cairo) with basic information on their legal rights. Sessions will specifically focus on refugee status/immigration status, legal procedures regarding issuing legalized marital licenses, divorce certificates, and birth certificates, and on the legislation concerning sexual harassment. Moreover, early marriage and female genital mutilation (FGM) will be tackled from a legal perspective. After every session, pre- and post- evaluation surveys will be conducted in order to evaluate whether attendees have gained the desired knowledge.
- 2- Within the framework of the project's fourth outcome (4-3), CARE Egypt is looking for a legal entity that can provide **Legal Assistance** through its lawyers to refugees who experienced any type of SGBV incidents.

Consultants will be expected to work in Alexandria and Damietta as well as Cairo in certain areas that will be defined.



Scope of Work and Deliverables:

The consultant's main deliverables are:

1- Legal sessions:

- a. The consultant shall provide online and/or offline awareness sessions to reach in total 120 beneficiaries, each group with a minimum of 15 to 20 participants. (the target is to be divided equally between Damietta, Alexandria and Cairo). Through the following:

 For field implementation, 6:8 awareness sessions conducted in With 15: 20 participants including total 120 beneficiaries (80 women 40 men), In Greater Cairo (40 women 20 men), Damietta and Alexandria (40 women-20 men)
- b. The consultant shall provide a document with the content of the legal awareness sessions. Content should be approved by CARE before conducting the sessions.
- c. The consultant shall provide pre and post surveys measuring change in participants' knowledge in the content delivered. Pre and post surveys should be approved by CARE before conducting the sessions. Analysis of the pre and post surveys will be done by the consultant and shared with CARE for reviewing and confirming.
- d. The consultant shall provide handouts to participants containing legal information to supplement the sessions. Handouts must be approved by CARE before conducting the sessions.
- e. Generate reports on each session conducted. Reports must include individual and collective results of pre and post surveys conducted measuring the change in attendees' knowledge towards their legal rights, legal procedures in the host country and legal consequences of sexual harassment, early marriage and FGM.

2- Legal Assistance:

- a. The lawyer shall provide 48 cases with legal counseling, representation and action to SGBV survivors from the refugees' population (the target is to be divided equally between Alexandria, Damietta and Cairo). It is estimated that 6 cases will receive legal consultations and 42 cases will receive legal actions.
 - In Alexandria and Damietta will provide legal service for 20 cases include 2 birth certificates, 4 police reports ,6 divorce ,6 custodies and 2 marriage certificate
 - In Cairo will provide legal service for 28 cases include 6 birth certificates, 6 police reports ,6 divorce, 4 marriage certificate and 8 custodies.
- b. The lawyer is expected to accompany SGBV survivors in filing police reports and court cases whenever necessary.
- c. Generate monthly reports and case studies. Reports must include updates and progress on each individual case handled by the consultant.
- d. The legal consultant is assigned to continue follow-up with extended legal procedures of the beneficiaries that takes time ahead the life span of the project.

Duties and Responsibilities

- 1. Meet with the project's team to discuss and agree on the content of the sessions and refine the work plan for the execution of the assignment.
- 2. Provide legal assistance for refugees SGBV survivors.
- 3. Conduct legal awareness sessions on refugee women's rights under the Egyptian legislation; highlighting the right procedures for issuing marriage, divorce and birth certificates.
- 4. Accompany SGBV survivors to police stations and courts.
- 5. Have the capacity to support women and men in court whenever needed.
- 6. Generate detailed reports on monthly basis on the cases that are assisted by the lawyer.
- 7. Document successes and lessons learned.
- 8. Attend a monthly meeting with CARE Case Management Supervisor, Project Manager and M&E unit
- 9. Respect and ensure the privacy of all beneficiaries, and maintain a non-discriminatory attitude at all times regardless of ethnicity, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, and political affiliation. As well as code of conduct and professional therapeutic relations.
- 10. The capacity to respond to emergency legal referrals throughout the week and during weekends depending on the referrals received (24/7).

- For all gov. (Damietta, Alexandria and Cairo), or only Cairo gov. or Alex and Damietta gov.
- For both deliverables (Legal sessions and legal assistance), or only one of them.
